PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

After Walter Brueggemann spoke here at Bethany in 2007, there was some discussion at a council meeting about the possibility of bringing other speakers here every year or every couple of years, to really help Bethany to be known as something of an educational center in this area. With the help of the synod and Lutheran Campus Ministry we have been able to put together another event featuring Dr. Audrey West, a Bible professor on the faculty of the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. She will be speaking here at Bethany on **Tuesday**, **February 2nd at 7pm** and I would strongly encourage you to be in attendance.

Audrey will be speaking about the Bible and how it is being understood and interpreted these days. Biblical interpretation is at the heart of many of the social issues that confront the church, and she will talk about ways that the Bible can be used to promote understanding rather than conflict. She is very gifted in her ability to present what can be rather complicated material in ways that make it engaging, easily understood and fun regardless of how much or how little you know about the Bible.

Dr. West is currently an adjunct faculty member at LSTC but was full time until a couple of years ago when she decided that living half a country away from her husband (who teaches at the Moravian Seminary in Bethlehem, PA) wasn't really a good thing. Now she is involved in writing and also speaking and teaching at various church events, regional gatherings and synod assemblies (she was the keynote speaker at the NGLS assembly last spring). The couple of years that I interviewed internship candidates in Chicago virtually every one cited Audrey as one of their favorite professors. In addition to that she is a delightful person! Kathy and I hosted her last spring and greatly enjoyed getting to know her.

In addition to her presentation at Bethany, Dr. West will also speak at NMU on Monday, February 1st at 7pm in the Brule Room of the University Center. In this talk she will talk more about environmental issues and what questions biblical ethics raises about decisions that are made concerning the environment. Both this presentation and the one at Bethany are free and open to everyone.

The turnout of Bethany people for the Brueggemann event was outstanding and I hope we can duplicate that! I can guarantee an informative, thought provoking and engaging presentation for those who come (and of course there will be coffee and snacks as well!)

Haiti Earthquake Relief

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

The images of the despair and destruction in the aftermath of the earthquake in Haiti continue to overwhelm us, but they also call forth our response of prayer and generosity.

Paul's letter to the Romans gives us words of comfort and hope. Paul writes: We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God (Romans 8:22-27).

Thank you for continuing to hold in prayer the people in Haiti and all those who are working to bring relief. Thank you for your generous financial gifts.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) is already working

through long-standing partnerships with The Lutheran World Federation and Lutheran World Relief to provide emergency food, water, shelter and medical supplies. This church is uniquely positioned to provide immediate and ongoing help. The ELCA has committed an initial \$250,000 from ELCA International Disaster Response, and we've authorized an additional \$500,000 as congregations respond both to the immediate needs and long-term rebuilding efforts.

I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Come unto Me and rest; Lay down, thou weary one, lay down Thy head upon My breast." I came to Jesus as I was, weary and worn and sad; I found in Him a resting place, and He has made me glad.

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Behold, I freely give
The living water; thirsty one, stoop down, and drink, and live."
I came to Jesus, and I drank of that life giving stream;
My thirst was quenched, my soul revived, and now I live in Him.

Anyone can work with adults, but it takes a special person to communicate with children. Among the early hymnists, none connected with youngsters better than Horatius Bonar, "the prince of Scottish hymnists."

Horatius was born just before Christmas in 1808, one of eleven children. Two of his siblings—John and Andrew—also became outstanding preachers. After studying for the ministry at the University of Edinburgh and serving an internship at Leith, Horatius was ordained and began pastoring in Kelso. Later he moved to Edinburgh where he became one of Scotland's most famous pulpiteers.

He began writing hymns while at Kelso, and many of them were especially for children. Later, in his church in Edinburgh where only the Scottish version of the Psalms was sung, only the children were allowed to sing his hymns. On one occasion in the adult services, two of his church leaders stormed out in protest when a hymn was announced. But the children never protested. They loved his visits to Sunday School when he would lead them in exuberant singing.

Horatius wrote, "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say" for his Sunday School children in 1846. He based his three verses on three wonderful promises of Jesus in Matthew 11:28, John 4:14, and John 8:12. The first half of each stanza echoes our Lord's promise, and the last half of each stanza frames our response.

Where did his love for children come from? He and his wife had lost five of their children in rapid succession. But God gave him hundreds of children in his Sunday Schools. And that's not all...

Many years later, a surviving Bonar daughter was widowed and returned home to live with her parents. She had five young children. Writing to a friend, Horatius said, "God took five children from life some years ago, and He has given me another five to bring up for Him in my old age."

Then Jesus spoke to them again, saying,
"I am the light of the world.
He who follows Me shall not walk in darkness, but have the light of life."


Souper Bowl of Caring - February 7, 2010


New Books For Lent

I've chosen books in the following three categories and presented one title from each here followed by a list of the titles available on the Library Kiosk: Fasting, the Way of the Cross, and Lenten Meditations. All of these have been traditional ways of reliving the Lenten Journey—I hope you'll investigate one of them this holy season.


Towns, Elmer. **Beginner's Guide to Fasting.** (248.4)



Elmer Towns Since Old Testament times, God's people have engaged in the spiritual tradition of fasting: going without food for a predetermined length of time to accomplish an important purpose or goal. Fasting can be done for any number of reasons: to get to know God better, to wait on God the beginner's coulde to for an answer to prayer, to listen to God, to worship Him. In these pages, you'll discover why you should fast, how to prepare for your first fast, what kind of fasts to follow, how to get started, and what to expect after you are finished. Learn how you can master this powerful spiritual discipline.

Peterson, John. A walk in Jerusalem; stations of the cross (242.4) This reworking of the centuries old ritual of the Stations of the Cross is illustrated with a map and 14 photographs as helpful guides to the Passion story, plus a meditation and brief liturgy to apply each "station" to today's world. A brief introduction also provides some of the history surrounding the development of this devotion.

Hays, Edward. A Lenten hobo honeymoon (242.34)



"...Jesus journeyed through life as a hobo, as one with 'nowhere to lay his head.' Lent, likewise, calls us to be hobos... <u>HO</u>meward <u>Bo</u>und pilgrims...who cannot rest until we rest in God, our final destination....Hoboes have secret signs...[and so the book] is filled with these hobo markings, which help point the reader along the path to a fruitful Lent, all the way to a joyous Easter...." (from the back cover)

French, Henry F. Lenten Journey: 40 Days with the Lord's Prayer. (226)

In a few short lines, the Lord's Prayer contains the heart and soul of Jesus' teaching. If you are interested in what God wants for you and what He wants from you, then you can do no better than spend forty days with Jesus in his profound prayer. (NOTE: this is one of the first books published as part of the Book of Faith initiative of the ELCA. It's a very deep look into the Lord's Prayer.)

The Lutheran is the official publication of the ELCA. Many members of Bethany have personal subscriptions, but for those who don't, the church purchases a number of copies each month and makes them available to interested members. If you haven't taken advantage of these free issues,

you are missing some interesting reading. To let you know what you are missing, I will highlight what's in the current issue and maybe entice you to have a look. It's worth the effort just to look at "The Light Side" and to read the Presiding Bishop's final note (it's always good!)

The <u>Cover Story</u> of January's issue is the global food crisis. The statistics alone are appalling, with over a billion people going hungry in 2009, an increase of 100 million over 2008! The article is followed by a companion piece about the Lutheran response and a number of suggestions of ways individuals and groups can help, especially by supporting ELCA World Hunger (www.elca.org/hunger). A "Finding Hope" Study Guide follows with a number of exercises to make the issue of hunger more personal and to give it a Christian focus. Related articles include "Wholesome Bread", "Fill It Up", and the presiding bishop's letter relating the hunger issue to the Lord's Prayer and the true meaning of "daily bread."

The first section of the magazine is <u>News</u>—news of the ELCA and the church around the world. This issue discusses budget and staff cuts in the ELCA, synod elections, noteworthy activities in a number of ELCA congregations, actions of the Lutheran church in Norway and Kenya, and other current religious happenings.

The <u>Features</u> section includes an article related to the Book of Faith initiative, one on Lutherans in Peru, one on the true meaning of the Hebrew phrase "Jealous God", one on facing anxiety, as well as others.

In <u>Departments</u>, there is always a letter from the editor (this one refers to reduced finances both for The Lutheran and the ELCA related to the current economic situation), a "Best this Month" referring to films, books and television, and the always interesting/controversial "Letters" section. One segment entitled "My View" gives readers the opportunity (in 400 words or less) to submit their opinions on a current societal event or issue or on issues in the life of this church (the ELCA). These views don't necessarily reflect those of The Lutheran or positions of the ELCA. The "Light Side" is a page of cartoons and short tales mostly relating the things kids say.

Space permitting, I will try to do a brief summary of the current issue of The Lutheran each month in Bethany's Outlook. Free copies are available either on the Library Desk or the magazine rack (also back issues) or you can go online (www.thelutheran.org,) to sign up for free online access and enjoy being informed about your church and the world.

- You know that UP is a place, not a direction




Have a Heart


(ELCA), presided. Reverend Lowell G. Almen preached. A reception followed the




